Homecoming

Phi Kappa Psi was paired with Gamma Phi Beta sorority and Delta Sigma Phi fraternity for Homecoming events. Our chapters bonded quickly through events such as Yell-Like-Hell, various tournaments, and service-based activities including Up 'til Dawn, Blood Drive, and the annual Glow Run.

Brennan Borgestad [14-1492] and Zach Nickles [13-1465] were the chapter's Homecoming Co-chairs, and they provided excellent leadership and motivation. With great participation from our partners, we placed first in Community Service, second in Tournaments, and third Overall, marking the highest overall placement for Phi Psi since our rechartering.

New Member Recruitment and Initiation

During the summer and early fall, brothers Mitch Conrad [13-1444] and Brennan Borgestad worked to recruit the next generation of Phi Psis at Iowa State. Their hard work paid off, as more than 30 new members joined this fall. They come from Minnesota, Illinois, Wisconsin, Nebraska, and Iowa, and all were heavily involved with Homecoming, Yell-Like-Hell, and intramurals in addition to their schoolwork. With this new class, Iowa Beta's roster exceeded 90 members, the largest since our rechartering in 2007.

In a change from recent years, initiation was delayed until January 16 in order to better assess each new member's scholastic ability. The names and hometowns of those initiated are listed on page 6.

Academics

The chapter had a decent semester academically, ranking eighth out of 30 IFC fraternities with a 3.07 GPA. Our new members did even better, fifth out of 30 with a 3.2 GPA.

Philanthropy

This fall, the chapter teamed up with several organizations to help serve the community. Included in this effort was the development of a new philanthropy — ISUPhilanthro — with the help of Iowa State's Student Government. Held in November, ISUPhilanthro included a 4k glow run and numerous booths for student-run organizations, including Dance Marathon, United Way, Engineers without Borders, and The Boys and Girls Club of Story County. Each organization was allotted a portion of the total proceeds corresponding to the percentage of tickets they collected from participants during the event. Student Government assisted in funding the event, allowing for 100% of the money raised to be donated back to the community. More than \$3,500 was distributed to the participating organizations.

Other organizations our members assisted fall term were: Food at First (serving food to the needy); Ames Park and Rec; Adopt-a-Highway; Habitat for Humanity; Heartland Senior Services (playing cribbage with the residents); Susan G. Koman Race for the Cure; Iowa League of Heroes (superheroes to the rescue!); Meals from the Heartland (packaging meals for delivery to starving people around the world); and various mentoring and tutoring programs.

Family Weekend



The chapter held its usual Family Weekend event on September 25. The weather was fantastic and more than 200 people attended — our largest gathering to date! Members enjoyed

During fall semester, at least 65% of the members were involved in on-campus clubs outside of Phi Psi. The chapter now has four members on Student Government, serving in either officer or representative roles for their respective colleges: George Melookaran (Treasurer); Adam Parker Goldberg (Design College Senator); Blake Singbush (Director of Academic Affairs); and new member Cody West (CALS Senator). Two members hold leadership positions within Dance Marathon: Rick Smith (Super Captain, Dancer Relations Committee) and Ethan Lindley (Media Relations Director). Additionally, Anthony Flynn served on Homecoming Central Committee and David Mathis served on Cyclone Alley Central Committee.

During the fall semester, the chapter enjoyed success in multiple intramurals, winning championships in both Flag Football and Volleyball. While academic success may be one of the primary objectives of college, our members continue to strive to grow beyond what they may learn in the classroom.

House Improvements

The chapter house underwent a number of improvements this semester, thanks to contributions from the Parents Association and donations made by member's families. Part of the proceeds from the silent auction at Family Weekend went toward a new television for the entertainment room, where brothers get together for movie nights, game nights, and our annual Super Bowl party.

A new outdoor grill was purchased for the patio and volleyball court area. This space is extensively used for new member recruitment and social events.

The Parents Association also paid for a new (and much better) lawn mower.

Finally, funds from the House Corporation and Parents Association paid for a refrigeration unit for a salad bar in the kitchen. All the brothers express their thanks and gratitude to those who provided these items.

A good contingency from Iowa Beta attended the 2015 WWLS, held June 17-20 at Creighton University in Omaha. More than 500 participants from around the country were on hand.

Several large and small group sessions were held, with excellent speakers and discussions throughout. Special emphasis was put on training for Presidents and Vice Presidents, Treasurers, Social/Risk Management Chairs, Recruitment Chairs, and Fraternity Educators.

A model initiation was held in front of a packed crowd in the beautiful St. John's Church on campus. Other activities included a movie night, a concert by Chris Jamison, a finalist on the TV show *The Voice* (and a Phi Psi from Capital University), a College World Series game, and, of course, the biennial District Council meetings where Archons were elected.

Several sessions were held for chapter advisors. The Fraternity is making a push for each chapter to have not only a chapter advisor, but also a chapter advisory committee, with individual members of the committee focusing on finances, recruitment, risk management, and fraternity education. The feeling is that if a chapter is going to have problems, it is usually in one or more of these areas. By spreading the workload around, it is hoped that there will be a better chance of catching any problems in these critical areas that might creep in.

To that end, a committee has been formed to work with the chapter advisor, Bill Good, and the initial members of that committee are: Ryan Page (finance), Jason Paul (fraternity education), Eric Lathrop (recruitment), and Nic Payne (risk management). We've also included Ben Reuter, a master's student in mechanical engineering, who is serving as our graduate scholarship advisor this year. Their contact information appears on page 4.

Fall 2015 Most Valuable Brother Awards

Jake, a senior in Landscape Architecture from Osceola, IA, has served the chapter as GP, VGP, and summer Recruitment Chair. He was elected to Cardinal Key as a junior, and was among 30 students chosen in his freshman year to be in the President's Leadership Class, a class that meets weekly at the Knoll with the University President.

Ben, a sophomore in Finance from Cedar Rapids, IA, has served the chapter as New Member Fraternity Educator and as Philanthropy Chair. On campus, he works with the event staff at the ISU Alumni Center and is Treasurer of the Business Council. Unfortunately for us, he's scheduled to graduate from ISU in just three years.

Both Jake and Ben are brothers who have done far more for the chapter than this brief summary indicates. They are solid brothers worthy of these awards.


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MVB, Continued

The Most Valuable Brother Award is a \$1,000 scholarship given to the undergraduate who has made the most positive impact on the chapter during the semester, as determined by his peers. The positive impact made by the recipient must fall within the parameters of the four pillars of the Greek Community at Iowa State, i.e., scholarship, friendship, leadership, and service. Two awards are presented each semester, one to an underclassman (first or second year of college) and one to an upperclassman (third year of college or above).

The inaugural MVB Awards were presented spring semester 2013 as a result of the generosity of James P. Grabenbauer, '73-948, and Jerry A. Soper, '73-956, who have provided funding for these awards for the first six years.

Author of Creed Enters Chapter Eternal



On December 5, 2015, the Fraternity lost one of its icons, Kent Owen, Indiana '58.

Kent was involved with Phi Psi continuously from the day of his initiation, serving as Archon as an undergraduate, and in several appointed positions as an alumnus. He is best known for his role as Mystagogue, a position he held for many years, and for his coauthorship of the Creed, at the tender age of 25, along with coauthor, John Henry Frizzell,

Amherst 1898, who was then 75 years of age!

Kent visited Iowa Beta three times in the late '70s and '80s, twice as keynote speaker at our initiation banquets, and once as our keynoter for our 75th anniversary banquet.

Since our rechartering, the Creed has been given much more than lip service. It is frequently discussed in new member education meetings and in chapter meetings. The undergraduates are given a business card with the Creed printed on it, and almost all of them carry it with them daily. It's a good read anytime.

I believe that Phi Kappa Psi is a brotherhood of honorable men, courteous and cultured, who pledge throughout their lives to be generous, compassionate, and loyal comrades;

I believe that I am honor bound to strengthen my character and deepen my integrity; to counsel and guide my Brothers who stray from their obligations; to respect and emulate my Brothers who practice moderation in their manners and morals; to be ever mindful that loyalty to my Fraternity should not weaken loyalty to my college, but rather increase devotion to it, to my country, and to my God;

I believe that to all I meet, wherever I go, I represent not only Phi Kappa Psi, but indeed the spirit of all fraternities; thus I must ever conduct myself so as to bring respect and honor not to myself alone, but also to my Fraternity;

To the fulfillment of these beliefs, of these ideals, in the noble perfection of Phi Kappa Psi, I pledge my life and my sacred honor.

Spotlight on: R. Lynn Johnson, '57-681


I graduated from Iowa State University with a BS in Engineering Operations in 1963. I was born and raised in Chariton, Iowa, with an older sister and a younger brother. With the exception of my time spent at Iowa State University and my service in the United States Marine Corps, I have been blessed to spend my life in my hometown. I married Nancy (whom I had dated 42 years earlier) in 2001 in Las Vegas. I wanted to wear the Elvis outfit and wanted her to wear the Priscilla one, but she wouldn't go along. Instead, we were married by a retired Methodist minister from North Dakota in the chapel at Treasure Island. And I am the proud father of two children and six grandchildren (although I regret that I lost both of my children to the University of Iowa).

Prior to attending ISU, I graduated from Chariton High School. My family ran a steel fabrication business called Johnson Machine Works (www.jmworks.com) that had been founded by my grandfather in 1907. From humble beginnings as a blacksmith's shop, JMW grew to become a major fabricator of structural steel, machined products, wastewater treatment equipment, large water control structures, and a variety of specialty products.

During WWII, our company participated in the war effort by fabricating ship hulls, buoys, and other components. After receiving the prestigious "E" Award from the Army/Navy, an award given to a very small percentage of participants in war-time production, we were hired by the Army Corps of Engineers and the Bureau of Reclamation to fabricate miter gates (like those you would see in service at the Panama Canal), tainter gates, slide gates, and other very large water control structures. That work continues to this day.

JMW also fabricates wastewater treatment equipment — large augurs, screw pumps, filtering equipment, etc. — that has been shipped all over the world. Structural steel fabrication is also done at JMW. Along with several bridges in the Midwest, we have provided structural steel for Linden Hall, Howe Hall, the Gerdine Business Building, Troxel Hall, and others on the ISU campus. Over the decades, we have supplied structural steel to several buildings in Des Moines, Iowa City (including the UI Football Practice Facility), the Quad Cities, and all over the Midwest. Incidentally, JMW fabricated the stairway to the basement of the Phi Psi house when it was remodeled in the late 1950's.

Growing up in the family business, I knew I would end up working at JMW. I spent my career working alongside my father, and eventually succeeded him as the third-generation President/CEO. I



retired in 1997, and my son is now the fourth generation to run the business.

Outside my career at JMW, my life has been filled with civic and philanthropic activities. I joined the Chariton Rotary Club in July of 1964. In November of 1970, my wife and I were selected by District 600 as their first members to participate in the Paul Harris Couple Exchange. We spent a month in South Africa living with Rotarians to learn about their activities. When we returned home, we spoke to most of the 50 Rotary Clubs in District 600 about our experiences. Because of that exposure, the Chariton Rotary Club submitted my name to the District Nominating Committee for District Governor. I was elected District Governor at the International Convention in Minneapolis in 1974, and was one of the youngest District Governors in Rotary International in 1974-1975.

Aviation has always been a passion of mine. I earned my pilot's license in 1957. I flew jets with the Marine Corps, and have since enjoyed my private aviation experience. Brother Bill Bywater ['58-697] was one of my first passengers. JMW purchased a Beechcraft Bonanza in 1967, and I flew to jobsites around the country until we sold it in 1990.

I remember my time at ISU fondly. My pledge dad was Dave Anthony ['54-627]. I lost contact with Dave after he graduated, but 25 or 30 years later I received a call from him. He was with Torrington Bearing, and had seen JMW's name on a plan holder's list for some tainter gate hoists. The hoists would require a lot of bearings, and Dave wanted to know if we would be bidding the job. Dave and I exchanged e-mails during the rebirth of the chapter in the late 1990s.

In November of 1956, we went on a pledge skip to the University of Illinois in Champaign, Illinois. We had just arrived at the Phi Psi house there when I got a phone call that my grandmother, who lived next door to us in Chariton, had died. One of my pledge brothers, Denny Day,

drove me to Chicago's Midway Airport to get a flight to Des Moines.

I also remember occasionally we would gather on the front steps of the fraternity house and "pitch pennies" at a crack in the sidewalk. Bruce Benschoter ['60-733] and I put on a water skiing show on Lake La Verne in April of 1960, during Veishea. I drove the boat and Bruce did the skiing with a girl from a ski club in Des Moines.

There was a campus chest at ISU that raised money for charity. Con Short ['56-670] helped them fundraise by eating goldfish. He spent time in the Memorial Union with a bowl of live goldfish, and would swallow one for, I think it was, \$5. After awhile he was challenged to bite one in two. He would do that for \$10. I recall he raised quite a bit of money for the campus chest.

I remember playing a lot of touch football on the front lawn. We had a number of brothers on the football, basketball, baseball, track, and wrestling teams: Bill Meyer ['55-645], Frank Powell ['55-649], Larry Swanson ['55-651], Dick Bertell ['55-654], Ken Sweeney ['56-665], Dwight Nichols ['56-672], Don Metcalf ['56-673], David Day ['57-677], Doug Borth ['57-678], Phil Groth ['57-680], Anthony Bertucci ['57-686], Pete Davis ['57-687], Arden Esslinger ['58-704], Bob Harden ['58-705], Cliff Rick ['59-717], Gary Astleford ['60-728], Larry Van Der Heyden ['61-744], and Chuck Walton ['61-754] are the ones I remember, but I am sure there were others.

Other Phi Psi's from Chariton are Judge Bill Stuart [IA Alpha, '39-592], who roomed with Nile Kinnick, Wiley Curtis ['47-455], and Harry Stewart ['54-630].

My wife and I spend the winter in Arizona. Over the years, we have gotten together for lunch with other Phi Psi's in the Grand Canyon state: Arlin Snesrud ['57-684], Bill Meyer ['55-645], Larry Swanson ['55-651], Doug Borth ['57-678], Pete Davis ['57-687], Wes Randell ['55-643], Bill McEniry ['55-652], Charles "Tuck" Foster ['55-656], Ron Barnes ['84-1157], and David Miller, [IA Alpha, '57-961].

I have a special place in my heart for the fraternal organization that made such a strong impression on me as a young man. And I am particularly grateful that the fellowship has remained a part of my life, extending far beyond my time at Iowa State University. I wish that same blessing on all of my Phi Psi brothers, past, present, and future.

In 1994, Dr. Rosenfeld joined



the St. Joseph Hospital medical staff as an internal medicine specialist. He served as chief of staff, with memberships on multiple committees and advisory roles. In 2010, he was honored with the Lifetime Achievement banquet. He retired from office practice in 2006, but continued part-time with St. Joseph's Cardio-pulmonary Services.
