Our Centennial Celebration

Iowa Beta has had a long and proud history. This chapter has produced great athletes, scholars, businessmen, and politicians, and more than 1,400 men have been initiated into our brotherhood at Iowa State. When we gathered together September 20-22 to observe the 100th anniversary of Iowa Beta's founding, there was a lot to celebrate.

The weekend began — as every proper Phi Psi outing does — with a golf tournament. The fall weather was perfect, and almost a third of the alumni registrants of the Centennial weekend participated in the tournament. Jim Watson, '70-882, did a fantastic job organizing the event. Friday evening was spent at the Alumni Center for the opening reception. The food was good, the drinks were better, but the highlight of the evening was the dueling pianos who kept everybody on the dance floor rolling through the night. A special guest appearance was made by Cy the Mascot, who surprised everyone by slipping the grip before revealing that the man inside the suit was none other than Mark Rissman, '11-1414.

Saturday morning found 316 Lynn abuzz with activity as everybody gathered at the chapter house for coffee and camaraderie. Inside, older alumni mingled with the undergraduates, regaling them with stories of their own time spent at Iowa Beta. Scrapbooks and old issues of the *ISU Bomb* yearbook brought back fond memories to many. Outside, more alumni filled the front lawn with games of football and Frisbee, reliving the days when this was the regular Saturday morning activity. The games were interrupted when a mysterious trailer pulled into the driveway. Out stepped Bill Bywater, '58-697, who

opened the trailer door to reveal a beautiful 1913 Model T Ford which he had brought in just for the occasion.

Saturday evening's banquet at the Memorial Union was a grand affair. With over 300 people in attendance, including 122 alumni, the ballroom was filled with Phi Psis and their sweethearts. Presiding as Symposiarch was Bill Good, '69-864, who introduced speakers including Dr. Thomas Hill, Senior Vice President for Student Affairs; Kevin Marks, Valparaiso '92, Phi Kappa Psi Director of Alumni Services; Rev. Dr. David McDonald, Beloit '82, the Fraternity's Mystagogue; and Randy Minear, '76-1036, House Corporation Board President. Special recognition was given to Dennis L. Stanley, '70-893, for his challenge gift to the Centennial Campaign and his generous contribution to the previous Rebirth of Iowa Beta Campaign.

Of course, the undergraduates found a way to interrupt the show with the not-so-subtle trick of stealing the microphone between speakers. Chapter President Benny Rohloff, '11-1411, presented a special plaque to Bill and Lindy Good for their dedication to their chapter throughout the years.

To end the evening, the brothers linked arms in a circle that spanned the entire perimeter of the Great Hall to sing *Noble Fraternity* and *Amici* before breaking out into a cheer of "High! High! High!" that shook the rafters of the Memorial Union. It was a joyous end to the weekend. Many thanks to those that were in attendance, and especially to the organizers, who made this a celebration never to be forgotten.

The Conclusion of the Centennial Campaign

The capital campaign held in conjunction with our chapter's centennial has concluded, and we are happy to report gifts and pledges were received from 105 brothers totaling \$325,880. What a fitting testament to the campaign's goal of "honoring our past and securing our future."

As has been explained in prior mailings, the campaign was jump-started by the challenge of Denny Stanley, '70-893,

who offered to match, on a dollar for dollar basis, the first \$100,000 of gifts made by other brothers. As has also been reported, Denny made the foundational gift to our earlier Campaign for the Rebirth of Iowa Beta. His generous and ongoing financial support has clearly been a driving force behind the successful comeback of our chapter.

Funds raised in the campaign will primarily be used to maintain the chap-

ter house and to accelerate pay-down of mortgage debt. We anticipate that the existing mortgage debt will be completely retired within 10 years. Some funds are also being used for scholarships, as per the direction of the donors.

Spotlight on James M. Patchett, '71-924

Jim Patchett is well known not only in the Iowa Beta Phi Psi world, but also in the world of sustainable design. So much so that he was the 2013 recipient of the Christian Petersen Design Award presented by the ISU College of Design. Named for the noted artist who was Iowa State's sculptor-in-residence from 1934-1955, the award is given annually to alumni, staff, and friends of the university for distinguished work that advances the design and art professions.

Brother Patchett is the founder and president of Conservation Design Forum (CDF), one of the nation's first sustainable design firms. Considered one of the innovators in melding art, science, and engineering in design, Jim and his team renovate landscapes with particular emphasis in the areas of sustainable site planning and development, the advancement of innovative water resource-management techniques, the integration of native landscape systems, and the promotion of ecological restoration strategies.

CDF's projects include one of the most famous green roofs in the world, located atop Chicago's City Hall. It won a Merit Award from the American Society of Landscape Architects (ASLA) and an Honor Award from the Illinois ASLA in 2002. His team was also responsible for the site development and the green roof of the ISU College of Design's King Pavilion, the first higher education building in Iowa to achieve LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Platinum certification. The project won a 2009 Design Award and a 2010 Honor Award of Excellence from the Iowa Chapter of the American Institutes of Architects.

Jim's accomplishments were featured in the fall edition of the College of Design's newsletter *Inspire*. To read about other projects and to see pictures of his work, go to <http://issuu.com/collegeofdesign/docs/inspirefall2013?e=2385386/5275181>.

In 2012, Patchett co-founded Whole Systems Integration, a collaboration of more than a dozen leading U.S. sustainable design firms to offer turn-key design, building and management services for high-performance projects. He also spearheaded formation of Solutions in the Land, a for-profit consortium to help farmers restore their lands' vitality and surrounding watershed. The company works to re-establish fertility to Midwestern soils and better manage agricultural water consumption. Recently, Jim and partners purchased more than 100 acres near South Haven, Michigan, to pursue ecological and research initiatives and to create demonstration farms, a conference and education center, an environmental research center, and a hotel.

In the mid-1990s, Patchett helped establish the Conservation Land Stewardship to ensure trained, capable installation



and subsequent management in restoring native ecosystems. He also co-founded the Conservation Research Institute, which pursues scholarship and investigation of sustainable issues.

Patchett is a Fellow of the ASLA and a LEED Accredited Professional. He received the Natural Leader Award from the Chicago chapter of the U.S. Green Building Council in 2008. He lectures nationwide on sustainable design and has taught in ISU's landscape architecture department.

A native of Muscatine, Iowa, Jim received a BS in Landscape Architecture in 1975, an MS in Landscape Architecture in 1981, and an MS in Civil Engineering in 1985, all from Iowa State. He completed his doctoral coursework at the University of Michigan.

Jim is married to Renee Oshinski, a Kalamazoo College graduate who later received her Master's in Public Administration at the LBJ School of Government, University of Texas at Austin. She is currently the Deputy Director of Vision 12 of the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. Jim and Renee have one child, Maggie, who is a sophomore at Illinois Wesleyan University majoring in theater with a minor in chemistry.

Since joining the chapter, Jim has remained involved at many levels. As an undergraduate, he served as traveling co-recruitment chair in the spring and summer of 1973 along with Brother Dave Batchelder ['71-927]. As an alumnus, he served in the late '70s and early '80s as the Iowa Beta Chapter Advisor and the National Area Director for Iowa Alpha and Iowa Beta. Later, he served as the Corporation Board President during the rehabilitation of the Iowa Beta chapter house and re-colonization of the chapter. More recently, he provided a summer internship for one of our undergraduates.

When asked about the value of fraternity membership, and what has kept him involved long after his undergraduate days, Brother Patchett doesn't hesitate: "The opportunities for educational, social, and leadership growth and development through involvement in a fraternity like Iowa Beta, with the support of a national fraternity like Phi Kappa Psi and a university like Iowa State, are immeasurable. Personal and professional growth potentials coupled with long-term networking benefits, not to mention the establishment of lifelong friendships, render the fraternity experience as important as ever in the development of college-aged men."

Academics

Spring semester 2013 rankings were not available when our last issue went to press. We ended up getting a chapter GPA of 3.03, which was the fifth highest GPA of all fraternities. For fall semester 2013, we had a chapter GPA of 3.01, the sixth highest of all fraternities. Fall semester 2013 saw 37 of our men get a 3.00 or above and 22 men get a 3.50 or above.



Graduate Advisor and House Director Update

Iowa State has a strong graduate degree program in higher education. In order to tap into all of the talent that comes to Iowa State each year for this program, we created a resident (live-in) graduate advisor position, and last year we connected with Scott Broady as our first graduate advisor.

We introduced Scott in our 2012 spring semester issue. Scott came from Gustavus Adolphus University in St. Peter, Minnesota, where he was an undergraduate. In addition to serving in various capacities in the student senate, the judicial board, and in several service and leadership programs, he co-founded the SAE fraternity chapter, the first national fraternity on that campus. Scott started with us fall semester 2012 and will be graduating spring semester 2014. Scott works primarily with our men in the area of scholarship.

This year we added a second resident graduate advisor: Valerie Hall (right) did her undergraduate work at Oklahoma, where she received multiple high-level awards and honors for her involvement on the OU campus. As a senior, she was elected in a campus-wide election to the student position to oversee 22 students who chair the 13 major campus activities at OU (translation: she ran the campus).



Following graduation, Valerie worked two years for the national office of her college sorority, Gamma Phi Beta, during which time she created and presented over 25 goal-oriented leadership and recruitment workshops focused on developing teamwork, interpersonal relationships, leadership styles, and communication skills. She helped establish two new chapters, which involved recruiting members and organizing and training officers.

At Iowa State, Valerie has an on-campus assistantship in the Student Activities Center. Her role at Phi Psi is primarily to work with officers and committee chairmen on leadership and goal achievement.

Valerie occupies the apartment on the first floor, which means that we do not have a live-in house director this year. But we still have a house director who quarterbacks the dinner-guest program, teaches etiquette to our new members, works with the parents association, arranges for family weekend, works with the caterer, and communicates regularly with our parents. She just doesn't live in. Lindy Good, wife of Bill Good ['69-864], is once again serving as house director, but in a slightly reconfigured role.

House Corporation Board Update:

Alumni Activities and Events; Mentoring and Networking

It's been several months since our Centennial celebration, but many of us are still lingering in the "afterglow" of that event and the prior build-up of the capital campaign. We thank everyone again for giving to the campaign and attending the Centennial — it was a lot of fun, and well attended!

We received quite a bit of feedback during and after the Centennial from brothers interested in sustaining the high level of alumni interest and participation inspired by the celebration. The Corporation Board has taken several actions to help maintain this momentum.

First, we have expanded the Board from six to eight directors: Bob Harding, '74-992, and Mike Gilhooly, '78-1046, have agreed to fill the additional seats.

Second, the Board has created two new committees. One is the Alumni Activities and Events Committee. This will be chaired by Mike Gilhooly, and includes Miles Moore, '80-1103, and Tim Hassel, '07-1330. 

100 YEARS OF IOWA BETA: As Told Through the Eyes of the Chapter

Peter notes in his introduction, "I have collected newsletters written to *The Shield* as the primary source of material, since these newsletters are written entirely by undergraduate members and allow for insight into the current life at Iowa Beta.

"One thing that struck me as I assembled this history is how much has remained the same over the years. Membership and scholarship, two of the biggest concerns that I recall as an undergrad, are forever a roller coaster of highs and lows. Parties and social activities abound, and our tradition in both varsity and intramural athletics is a constant source of pride. Even the chapter house, which has undergone numerous updates and renovations, provides a strange level of consistency in that it is always undergoing change.

"Perhaps the most important theme that I found in these pieces is the camaraderie amongst the brothers. Clearly the brotherly love that unites us is much stronger than a mere co-residency at college, and I hope that you can get the same feeling as you read through this book."

The book is dedicated to the late Dick Koch ['42-329]. Dick dedicated much of his life to the Iowa Beta Chapter. He was elected GP in 1947 after serving in the Army during WWII. He continued to serve Iowa Beta for more than thirty years as an advisor to the chapter and as treasurer of the Corporation Board. Although many helping hands have assisted the growth and development of Iowa Beta, Dick's long-term commitment to the ideals of Phi Kappa Psi are exceptional.
