
# **Monday Dinner Guests**

# ISU and Phi Psi Awards

Two awards are presented each semester, one to an underclassman (first or second year of college) and one to an upperclassman (third year of college or above).

The inaugural MVB Awards were presented spring semester of 2013. They have been funded by the generosity of James P. Grabenbauer '73-948 and Jerry A. Soper '73-956.

# Spotlight on: James P. Grabenbauer '73-948

Editor's note: Brother Jim Grabenbauer is an lowa Beta Corporation Board member, occasional guest speaker at the chapter, and co-sponsor of the Most Valuable Brother Award given to four brothers each year. A little about his story:

I grew up in Marshalltown. My folks set a firm expectation that we get A's in school and pay for our own college. They worked at Fisher Controls, an engineering dominated company. Dad pushed me to go that way despite my greater talent in chemistry and life sciences than math. Iowa State was the obvious choice, despite having grown up a Hawkeye fan. Of course, that immediately changed.

High school friend and brother, Fred Zewe '74-962, had an older brother, Ray '71-922, who was a Phi Psi. That tie landed me at the chapter. We had a large Marshalltown contingent back then with

brothers Dave Benson '70-904, Bob Wolter '71-911, Ray Zewe, Jim Goodman '69-871, Ken Lyons '71-923, and Pat Kapaun '71-920 already in the chapter. Mark Hall '73-950, Dave Harrison '74-961, Fred Zewe, Dave Jansen '74-981, and John Dankbar '74-960 joined from my class.

I served as House Manager, helping to rebuild the pool when the April 1973 blizzard caved it in and killed the heater. I also worked on several homecoming lawn displays and VEISHEA float committees. I waited tables at Kappa Delta sorority for three years as well.

The 1970s were good times for ISU football fans during the Majors and Bruce eras. As pledges, we'd get to Clyde Williams Field at 8 A.M. for 1 P.M. games to hold seats for the entire chapter and their dates. There was a crush at the stadium gates as we rushed to get prime seats. My wife, Lisa, and I remain huge Cyclone fans and supporters.

We had some real high-character brothers in the chapter back then — and then we had some that were just, well, characters. Jim Miller '71-925 tutored me in physics and went on to be a professor, while several brothers showed me the precise technique for jumping off the roof into the pool. Ken Lyons got into medical school after three years, while I spent three years being a senior. Bob Wolter successfully ran VEISHEA as president, while Pat Kapaun and Randy Hillman '70-886 faced off for demolition derby in our frozen ice rink of a parking lot.

My transition to college wasn't easy. I'd been too busy in high school with work and studies to get into any trouble. Strict and observant parents held me accountable, but didn't allow me to grow from teenage mistakes. With my newfound freedom in college, I abused alcohol and frequently changed majors — from Chemical Engineering to Pre-Med to Civil Engineering to Industrial Engineering to Business, and finally back to IE.

Running out of my hard-earned savings was inevitable. I started working as a second-shift building electrician and lift-

truck mechanic at the Ames 3M plant. I had just met Lisa Ritter, a charter member of Zeta Tau Alpha. She was smart, emotionally mature, and had her act together. In the words of Jack Nicholson, "She made me want to be a better man." Despite my issues at the time, she saw a gentleman with potential. We got married and I finally finished my engineering degree.

I was fortunate to graduate when the job market for engineering was exceptionally strong, and I had good offers. Employers were looking for hard-working, responsible people. That 3M job, plus chapter activities, really helped in that regard. My first job out of college was packaging engineering at AT&T's twomillion-square-foot Omaha Works. I loved the plant, the people, and the job. I got to design both the product packages and the packaging systems. It challenged and stimulated my creativity. I

added the material-handling fleet, the raw-material storerooms, and the distribution warehouse as my responsibilities grew. The plant was a city within itself, with golf, softball, and volleyball leagues. Lisa joined the plant as an IT developer and business analyst after she completed her MBA. We made dozens of close friends there.

I started working on my MBA at Creighton when Lisa completed hers. We had started a family and couldn't go at the same time. A year later, I was accepted into AT&T's Industrial Engineering Summer on Campus master's program at Purdue, and completed both degrees together. Toyota's process improvement principles and techniques, cellular manufacturing, JIT, 5S, Kanban, standard work, and synchronous manufacturing were the hot IE topics at that time, and have endured. I moved to manufacturing and had some interesting high-visibility projects applying these techniques; reducing throughput time, dramatically improving quality, and reducing floor space.

After the tech bubble burst in 2001, our entire management team was offered an enhanced retirement package, which I jumped at. That Purdue MSIE paid off, as I got a Lean process improvement manager job at Union Pacific Railroad (UP). It was a great opportunity to change the culture of an entire company using Lean to identify and solve problems. I got my Six Sigma Black Belt and was promoted to Director in 2008, and happily retired this last September.

I've had some interesting hobbies and activities along the way. Our oldest son, Kurt, was five when soccer took off in Omaha. I went to sign him up and ended up coaching that team and all three of our kids for 13 years at both recreational and competitive levels. Kurt ended up as an All-American. Once the kids were out of soccer, I took up golf. Three lessons from a great instructor dropped my nine-hole league handicap from

a torturous 17 to a respectable 5 in two seasons. I'm a mid-80s player now, but playing the senior tees with fellow retirees during the week. Days that I can't play golf, I'm in the gym.

Lisa and I celebrate out 40th wedding anniversary in February. She's been a devoted mother and wife. A lifetime learner, she completed her PhD in IT in 2015, and started Prairie Star Botanicals, a health and beauty products manufacturer. We have three great kids: Kurt (36), married to Caroline and a business owner; Ross (32), finishing his ten-year Navy nuclear assignment in July; and Claire (28), who served in the Air Force and is completing her Accounting degree with a great job lined up. Alas, no grandkids yet, but surely one day. In the meanwhile, two large Boxers, Beckett and Bella, will have to do.

I got back to being involved with the chapter through our Omaha neighbor family's oldest son, Mark Mendick, Jr. '11-1410. Mark is a sharp and enterprising young man, so I advised him to look at engineering as a profession. When he started at Iowa State in 2011, I asked him to check out Phi Psi. We all know the hard work that Bill and Lindy had put into making our chapter house a great place to live and grow through college. Mark checked it out, joined, and had a great fraternity experience. Bill appreciated the referral and subsequently asked if I'd be interested in being on the Corporation Board. I have now served six years, and will be around for another three-year term.

I have always been deeply appreciative of the great start that Iowa State gave me in my career, and for that reason, I set a goal some time ago to give a certain dollar amount back to Iowa State before I retired. Union Pacific has a great matching gifts program that I was able to take advantage of to leverage my gifts to the ISU Foundation. My initial gifts were given for the general purposes of the Engineering College, which was fine, but I developed the feeling that my gifts were just kind of lost in the large pool of gifts from other donors, that they didn't have a meaningful impact on anything in particular.

The financial generosity of Denny Stanley '70-893 and the outstanding sweat equity of Bill Good '69-864 in getting the chapter rechartered got me searching for a way to use my gifts to the ISU Foundation for Phi Psi. So, Bill and I and a representative from the Foundation worked together to create the Most Valuable Brother (MVB) Award. This award is a \$1,000 scholarship given to the Phi Psi undergraduate who has made the most positive impact on the chapter during the semester, as determined by his peers. Two awards are given each semester, one to an underclassman and one to an upperclassman.

This has turned out to be a proverbial win-win-win situation. Iowa State gets money for student scholarships. I get credit for Iowa State giving, knowing that the money will go directly to help Phi Psis. And the selected students get a financial boost in these high-tuition times.

Perhaps just as important are the intangible benefits. The student gets well-deserved recognition from his peers and an important bullet point for his resume. And I get some well-written thank-you letters and impressive resumes from our outstanding MVB recipients.

Jerry Soper '73-956 has joined in contributing to this award, which is now endowed at a level that will last for a full generation of Phi Psis.

So if I may make a plug: while similar scholarships can be designated through the Phi Psi Foundation at the National Office, if giving to Iowa State is important to you (along with Phi Psi), then I would invite you to add to the MVB fund at the ISU Foundation. Or, if you prefer, design your own Phi Psi scholarship at the ISU Foundation. And, if your employer has a matching gifts program, so much the better.

lowa Beta has some fine young men with impressive resumes in challenging fields of study. The chapter's future is in good hands with these young men as leaders, and it's personally satisfying to help reward them for their successes.

# Thomas J. Miller '69-873 Receives Citation of Merit



Thomas J. Miller (with wife Terry in photo) recently received the Citation of Merit from the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, an award given to distinguished alumni of the college who have demonstrated outstanding achievement and received national or international recognition. The award was presented last fall during the annual Iowa State Homecoming Honors and Awards Ceremony.

Brother Miller spent most of his career with Microsoft, starting in 1989. He was a member of the team that created a "from scratch" version of a new Windows implementation in 1993, called Windows NT. He was the architect and key implementer of the NTFS file system and the cache manager. He also worked on scale-out projects for Microsoft Exchange Server, SQL Server, and, most recently, was the initial architect and developer of a new ultra-reliable file system called ReFS.

Tom was in the first class to graduate from ISU in the "new" department called Computer Science. His first job was with Digital Equipment Corporation as one of the first two college hires ever in their small software division. He later helped establish a software consulting startup, Paranor AG, with three European friends in Bern, Switzerland.

Now retired, brother Miller devotes considerable time to supporting his favorite nonprofits, Save the Children and Habitat for Humanity, and serves on the board of a local progressive political organization. # Gold Star Hall Ceremony Honors Robert Geoffroy '41-321



On Veteran's Day, November 6, 2017, the Gold Star Hall Committee held its annual ceremony in the Great Hall of the Memorial Union to honor former ISU students who died in the service of their country. One of this year's four honorees was Phi Psi brother Robert Geoffroy, an Army Air Force pilot who was killed in an airplane crash in 1944. In the absence of living family members, a delegation from Phi Kappa Psi attended the ceremony and received the memorial coin presented by the Iowa State Veteran's Center on his behalf. Reprinted below is the address presented at the ceremony by Kristin Erdman, marketing coordinator for the Memorial Union and director of the event.

Second Lieutenant Robert S. Geoffroy was born to Howard Oscar Geoffroy and Eva E. Williams in January of 1922. He grew up an only child in Sterling, Illinois. Sterling is a small city in Northwest Illinois, most commonly known for its long association with manufacturing and the steel industry. This is why it was formerly nicknamed "The Hardware Capital of the World."

Robert graduated from St Mary's Community High School in 1939. During his high school years, he participated in band, orchestra, and was an athletics manager.

Robert went on to become an engineering student at Iowa State University. Robert was also interested in Phi Kappa Psi fraternity, and was initiated on April 29, 1941. He eventually became the president of his pledge class. His Phi Psi brothers remember him having a sparkling wit and ready humor. In addition to the time he spent on fraternity activities, he was extremely involved on campus. Whether it was for the Society of American Military Engineers, the Newman Club, or intramural athletics, Robert was always busy contributing to Iowa State.

As president of Phi Kappa Psi, Robert was in charge when the outbreak of World War II meant that the Beta Chapter house had to temporarily close, as did many other lowa State fraternities. Iowa State's on-campus housing was needed to accommodate military trainees during WWII, so fraternity houses were pressed into service for student housing needs. Robert wrapped up the house's business affairs before he too joined the military.

Robert entered the service on August 9, 1943, in Chicago, Illinois. He trained at the Army Air Force Navigation School at San Marcos, Texas. Described as "unusually brilliant," Robert completed his six-month course for classification tests at Bucknell University in three short months. With flying colors, Robert also passed his mental, psycho-motor and physical examinations at the Army Air Force's Classification Center in Nashville, Tennessee. Because of this, he was selected for navigator, his first choice. He made cadet lieutenant on February 20, 1944, and was commissioned a second lieutenant on September 25, 1944.

After all of Robert's schooling and testing were over, the Army Air Force granted him a seven-day leave that he spent at home with his parents in Sterling. After that leave, Robert reported to Westover Field, Massachusetts, on October 5, 1944 as the navigator of a B-24 bomber.

Only nine days in, and on his second mission, he and his crew went missing on October 15, 1944, a late Sunday night. A search soon discovered that he and eight other members of his crew died when their plane crashed into the Camel's Hump Mountain at 4,083 feet. James Wilson of Jackson, Florida, was the only man to survive, though he had several injuries. Civil Air Patrol planes located the men on the mountainside, and the recovery team spent over two days climbing the mountain to locate the crew. They returned to base with the bodies of the fallen men.

Robert was 22 years old when he died.

He was buried in Calvary Cemetery in Sterling, Illinois, on October 25, 1944. The *Sterling Gazette* described the funeral crowds as "unusually large." Phi Kappa Psi performed their ritual at the grave, as did the color guard.

Lt. Col. Elwood P. Donahue wrote, "He was extremely devoted to his work and was congenial, friendly, and cooperative in everything he did. All of us feel his loss is indeed a great one. Robert was a superior solider in every way and a man of the finest character. He was the type who gladly gives his life for his country."






